## **ACADEMIC PROGRAM**

### **Draft**

The Master of Accountancy is a 30- 37.5 credit program designed to prepare students for high-level **professional careers in the public and private sectors**. It is a flexible program tailored to individual interests and career objectives in accounting, financial management and tax practice. Students with a Bachelor of Science degree in Accounting\* from a US accredited university can complete the requirements in one year.

No business background is necessary prior to joining the program. In addition to required courses in introductory accounting, finance, economics and statistics, students can choose from a wide range of specialized accounting subjects as well as other business topics which help them prepare for their **professional certification**. The program may be pursued on a full-time or part-time basis. Day and evening classes are available and prior work experience is not required.

#### **Program Planning**

The Master of Accountancy program consists of two programs. Program A can be completed in 34.5-37.5 credit hours. Program B can be completed in 30 hours and is designed for students who hold a Bachelor of Science in Accounting\* degree from a US university or have passed the CPA tests (A Bachelor of Business Administration with a concentration in accounting does not apply.)

Both programs are flexible and allow students to choose from a wide range of accounting courses as well as a range of electives from the School of Business graduate course listings.

#### Program A Curriculum (37.5 Credits)

12 hours of required courses,  
15 hours of accounting, business law, or taxation elective courses, and  
10.5 hours of business electives (which may be in accounting, business law or taxation).

#### Program B Curriculum (30 Credits)\*

6 hours of required courses,  
12 hours of accounting, business law, or taxation graduate elective courses, and  
12 hours of graduate business electives (which may be in accounting, business law or taxation)

*All 6 hours of required courses may be waived with substitution following the Department's waiver policy. If all required hours (3 courses) are waived, then 6 hours in elective graduate courses from the School of Business must be substituted (2 courses) and include a graduate finance course.*

- Bachelor in Business Administration with a concentration in accounting does not qualify for program B.

## Recommended Sequence of Courses

You should be aware that not all accountancy courses are offered every semester, which may affect the order in which you complete courses. Students should also check the prerequisites for certain courses (see The George Washington University Bulletin or the website at [www.gwu.edu/~accy](http://www.gwu.edu/~accy)).

# UNIVERSITY POLICIES

## Student Health Service

Students under age 26 are required by DC law to submit a current immunization record to the Student Health Service within 30 days of beginning the first semester of study. Students who have not completed and returned their immunization card will not be allowed to register or drop classes. The Student Health Service will place a hold on their account until the immunization card is returned to the Student Health Service.

## Course Waivers

Waivers may be granted based upon previous coursework or through proficiency examination. Under no circumstances can courses be waived based on previous work experience. Contact your Academic Advisor for courses eligible for waiver.

Previous Coursework: Program core course requirements may be satisfied by evidence of successful completion of comparable work at a regionally accredited or recognized foreign college or university under the following circumstances:

1. A minimum grade of “B” is required in all courses presented for waiver consideration. “B-”, “Passing”, or “Credit” grades will not qualify.
2. The course work must clearly have covered the same material.
3. Courses must have been taken within **five years** prior to enrollment in the program.

Supporting documentation for core course waivers must be submitted prior to the start of the program.

Proficiency Exams: Students who did not qualify directly for waivers based on previous coursework may take proficiency examinations for some of the required courses, Proficiency examinations will be offered prior to the beginning of the first and second semester of enrollment. **Each examination may be taken only once.**

Note: Up to four (4) credits or two (2) courses only may be waived from the program without substitution.

## Transferring Courses

While core courses may be waived by meeting the above requirements, up to six elective credits may be transferred into the second level of the academic program. The requirements for course transfers are:

- The course must have been taken within **two years** of the student’s first registration in the academic program or while completing his/her degree.
- The student must receive a grade of B or better for any transfer courses.
- The student must file a petition with his/her Program Advisor, along with a course syllabus, for approval prior to taking the course.
- Once the course has been completed, the student must submit an official transcript from the school where the course was taken to his/her Program Advisor. The course will then be added as an elective transfer to the student’s permanent GW record and transcript.

## **Scholarships and Fellowships**

## **FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS**

### **What is a complete application?**

An application is complete when it includes all the required materials (Application, fees, three letters of recommendation, statement of purpose, resume, transcripts and GMAT scores as well as TOEFL scores when applicable).

### **How long does it take to process my application?**

When your application is complete, you can have the admission results within two weeks.

### **What is lowest acceptable TOEFL score?**

The university requires a minimum TOEFL score of 600 written, 250 computer-based and 100-ibt.

### **What is the average GMAT?**

The average GMAT is about 660 but applications are evaluated as a whole and students with lower GMATs can receive admission. However, a minimum GMAT score of 520 is required before an application can be processed.

### **What is the required GPA?**

Such information is not available since GPAs vary in different countries and the grading system is not uniform worldwide.

### **What is the difference between waiving and transferring a course?**

### **What about placement?**

Students receive a lot of information and placement help from our graduate career center. Recruiters visit the university and networking is a great tool.
