Housing




Due to the limited housing available on-campus, GW does not offer on-campus housing for graduate students. However, our team has collected a number of resources over the years that are designed to help you, as an international student, secure housing in Washington, D.C.!

First Steps

Graduate students have a number of different options for housing. As a first step, we encourage you to take a look at the following websites and documents:

At this point, we also suggest thinking about your "must have" list. What features and amenities are you unable to live without? What's nice to have, but not a requirement? This will help you decide which apartments to visit once you arrive in Washington, D.C. For example:

- How many **bedrooms** do you need to have? How many **bathrooms**?
- Does it matter if **pets** are allowed?

- Do you want private **outdoor space**, like a private balcony?
- Is it necessary for the apartment complex to have a **fitness center?** A **pool**?

Neighborhoods

You've got the tools, now it's time to decide where you want to live!

Making Decisions

Personal preferences are generally the deciding factors in choosing a home:

- Is cost a key issue? The further away from the city, the less expensive the housing.
- Does the neighborhood match your lifestyle and the type of community you want to live in?
- Does the neighborhood feel safe to you? The safety of Washington, D.C. neighborhoods can vary, as can people's comfort levels. You may want to check-out https://crimecards.dc.gov/ for additional information regarding certain areas.
- Will you be using public transportation? Living in the city requires less travel time.
- Do you own a car? Parking outside of the city tends to be less expensive.

We *strongly* encourage you to visit any apartment you're interested in - photos can be deceiving, so make sure to check it out in-person! You can use the <u>Apartment Search Checklist</u> when visiting a house or apartment to be sure you find an apartment that meets your wants and needs.
