Students have the option of residing in an international student community at our Foggy Bottom Campus in the heart of Washington, D.C. Our campus is accessible by public transit and within walking distance of the White House, Smithsonian Institution and the World Bank. Residence halls are staffed by full-time program assistants who help students integrate into GW by providing social and cultural programs. These include sessions with admissions and career representatives, site visits to cultural institutions and day trips to nearby sites. Students have full access to university facilities, libraries, fitness centers, computer labs and student health services.

ACADEMIC WRITING AND RESEARCH I & II

An academic writing course that prepares students for the writing expectations of graduate school in the U.S., focusing on research and source use; planning, drafting and revising academic papers; and improving vocabulary and grammar for clear and effective writing.

ACADEMIC COMMUNICATION

An interactive course that acclimates students to the oral communication expectations of graduate school through understanding contexts for academic speaking, expanding communicative vocabulary, leading and participating in class discussions and preparing and delivering informal and formal presentations.
